Ouellette, Valcourt win selectmen seats

Judith Ann is Housing Authority winner

Steven Ouellette won a seventh term on the Board of Selectmen Tuesday and will be joined by Brian Valcourt who had served a previous stint on the board.

Both candidates for the two available seats beat candidate Richard Spirlet, also a former selectmen who had served until his defeat in the previous elections.

Mr. Ouellette won 1,067 votes, Mr. Valcourt got 1,004 votes and Mr. Spirlet won 904 votes.

In the only other race for which there was ballot competition, Judith Ann Menard beat Craig D. Minone to win a seat on the town's Housing Authority. Ms. Menard won 1,015 votes to Mr.

Students, teachers: Leave class schedule alone

Many defend high school's four longer classes

The message was clear from high school students and teachers alike at a recent Westport School Committee workshop: Don't mess with our block scheduling.

There had been talk at several earlier meetings about whether the school would be better served by the present schedule of four longer daily classes of up to 84 minutes each, or reverting to a more traditional six-class format with classes of around 50 minutes each.

Richard Monast graduated from Westport High and is an English teacher there now. He said he has experience with both systems.

"With a six-period day, "I recall a lot of time spent in the hallways, a lot of

chaos, a lot of confusion plus an almost unimaginable workload for students and teachers alike," Mr. Monast said.

Longer classes allow more individual attention, more depth — "I had the most rigorous and impactful AP history class of my entire career right here," he said.

Hailey Charest, president of the senior class, spoke of the extracurricular activities and sports she had been involved with and said that block scheduling has enabled her to focus on things beyond coursework.

She said she gets more out of the longer classes.

Students are able to "debate controversial issues, talk about the deep stuff .. problem solve, work with each other," things that 50 minutes doesn't enable.

English teacher Regina Mercer said she was apprehensive about teaching an 84-minute class when she transferred to Westport after working in a six-class school system.

"I grew to love it," she said, adding that it is a vast improvement over trying "to rush through 50-minute periods trying to get things accomplished."

It enables her to devote more time to individual students, and focus more on intensive writing. And it brings "lighter backpacks" as students are relieved of the burden of lugging six classes worth of books around — they are also relieved of six classes worth of homework.

"Students thrive as do the teachers," she said, adding that she fears the old way would result in the loss of popular elective classes like forensics, public speaking and debate."

Senior Evan Gendreau said he made the wait-list at Georgetown University

and is convinced that he would have been turned down had he not been exposed to the longer, more intensive classes.

History teacher Norm Abramson recalled that in 2010-11, the schools went the old six-class route.

"It was a complete failure," he said and prompted a student petition with more than 300 signatures calling for a return to longer classes.

School leaders reply

After listening, several school committee members as well as the superintendent of schools voiced support for leaving things as they are.

Superintendent of Schools Ann Marie Dargon pointed to new numbers from the state which show a Westport graduation rate of 93 percent in 2016. The dropout rate has fallen from 10 percent

in 2012 to 1.4 percent in 2016 — "Amazing."

"If it's not broken, why try to change it."

"I recommend that you keep block scheduling as is," said school committee Chairwoman Nancy Rioux.

Committee member Margot Desjardins asked why this is something the committee is even talking about.

"This is a matter for the superintendent and principals to decide. It is a tool," and if it works, "they should be allowed to use it."

Committee member Mark Carney countered that the schedule is an appropriate topic for discussion.

"It is our place to understand the effectiveness ... To leave something off an agenda because it is a tool versus a policy doesn't make sense to me. We need more sessions like this ... to make our schools better."

Minone's 388 votes. Maurice E. May won a three-year seat on the Board of Health. Although he was not contested on the ballot, he did face a write-in challenge from Constance Gee who entered her name as an advocate for improved protections for Westport's farm animals (May won 1,057 votes to Gee's 198 write-ins).

In other Tuesday voting, Westport approved Question 1, a measure to remove excise taxes on machinery, farm implements and certain farm animals belonging to non-commercial farmers. The question won 54.5 percent of the votes — 663 yes, 552 no.

Casino tour produces mixed reactions

Some say visit bypassed areas of interest, concern

TIVERTON — A site visit by the Tiverton Planning Board to the future Twin River Casino location in north Tiverton Saturday afternoon drew a crowd of 66 town officials and members of the public, that descended into the woods over a stone and gravel construction road to see what was there.

The group began its tour near the future entrance to the 45-acre casino site at the intersection of William S. Canning Boulevard, near its intersection with Stafford Road and Hilton Street.

It emerged about an hour later with mixed opinions regarding the project and property that is in the very early stages of development.

"It's informative to a degree," said Don Featherstone, who favors the casino, and was there with his young grandson. "But it's pretty early on in the going. I don't have any issues."

"It was a big disappointment," said Roger Belanger, an IT consultant, who lives nearby on Stafford Road and says his property line is 200 feet from the casino property line.

"What needed to be seen wasn't shown — Sucker Brook, an intermittent stream they're going to be disturbing, the nuts and bolts of historical features such as a former mill," Mr. Belanger said.

"And Medicine Bear, (a representative of the Pocasset Tribe) told me there have been no historical studies done. Stone walls have been knocked down and we saw no evidence they were being stored."

Mr. Belanger is the leader of a group called Save Tiverton, which opposes the casino and has been calling recently for an independent peer review of the impact of the casino on environmental, historical, and cultural resources.

The touring group included about 10 members of Twin River staff, at least two Tiverton Town Council members (Council President Joan Chabot and member Joe Perry), and some members of the planning board (but not enough to constitute a quorum, so a formal board meeting could not be declared).

The assemblage was led by Twin River attorney W. Mark Russo and engineer-project manager Christine Shea, who acted as tour guides.

The path they took was over a crescent-shaped temporary roadway (made of crude construction rock and treacherous rip-rap) that led downhill towards Route 24, then curved south and west, and cradled — on the uphill side — a woods that would soon be the site of the casino itself. (Twin River hosts required all who were on the walk to sign liability waivers.)

The Twin River hosts narrated what would be built in various locations — the casino

here, a hotel there, a two-story parking structure over there, and so on. The site will include assorted other features, such as wetlands protection, surface parking and paths and a bridge across some wetland areas.

Saturday, however, all there was to see was woods, no construction underway at all, and in the distance, mostly concealed by brush, what appeared to be a stone wall.

"We're going to have our artifacts and campsites destroyed. It's sacred land," said Andy (Medicine Bear) Noronha, a representative from the Pocasset Tribe who was present.

Susan Anderson, who is chairwoman of the Tiverton Historical Preservation Advisory Board, talked with Medicine Bear, who she said told her that the "higher ground and where the water is" (generally on the upper east side of the overall casino site area) is where the Indian village was, and where there once were said to be over 100 dwellings.

Ms. Anderson said the exact location of this village is a good question that needs answering.

"I don't think they're giving historical and environmental issues any real consideration," said Karen Benson, an attorney representing Save Tiverton. "It's sort of a fait accompli."

Richard Enser, a consulting wildlife ecologist, formerly with the Rhode Island Department of Environmental Management, said as he was emerging from the casino site that "the habitat assessment that Twin River did is awful, it's useless. For example, the study it did of breeding birds "was done out of the breeding season."

Others, asked at random on the site visit,

had comments.

Council member Joe Perry said it became known a month ago that a "flow test didn't pass." The test gauges the availability of water to the casino site (for consumption and fire suppression).

What that means, he said, is that some method of storing water on the site (a tower or tank) is going to be needed.

What does this mean for the project, he was asked. "There's nothing we can do. All we can do is make sure they do everything they said they were going to do."

"I think it's disgusting," said Loren King, a Fall River (Norman Street) resident who lives near the site of the casino. "It's a done deal. It feels like the town council is working in conjunction with Twin River." Ms. King attended and spoke at a recent Tiverton council meeting.

After the site visit, Mr. Belanger said the Save Tiverton group was going to continue to pursue the environmental issues. "Fall River people are coming forward. There's

more visibility about what's at stake," he said.

A recent plea by made by Save Tiverton's lawyer Karen Benson to the Tiverton Town Council, to have the environmental, historical, and cultural issues at the casino site subjected to peer review by independent parties, was directed to the planning board.

According to Planning Board Chairman Stu Hardy, those issues are more properly taken up later in the planning process, and the time of preliminary plan review on May 2.

The site visit did not focus or concern itself with traffic and the proposed new roundabout at the entrance site to the casino. "I'm getting the impression it's hands-off with the roundabout," said Susan Gill, the planning board vice-chairmen.

The roundabout will regulate traffic at the intersection of William S. Canning Boulevard near its intersection with Stafford Road and Hilton Street — believed by officials to be one of the most dangerous in Tiverton — and must be built before the casino can open.

So problematic is the safety at that location that a police detail was dispatched to control the vehicle and pedestrian traffic for Saturday's site visit — likely a first for the planning board's site visits.

Selectmen grant license to SoMa Imports

But drawn-out process stays heated to the end

Kyle DeMelo was given the permission he needed recently to open a dealership specializing in unusual, primarily Japanese, cars.

But not all were thrilled with the Board of Selectmen decision to allow the small business at 15-A High Street which is the lot to the rear of 878 State Road.

Mr. DeMelo said that his business, SoMa Imports, will keep up to six vehicles in the 3,500-square foot building and that sales will be conducted primarily through the internet.

Several residents of the neighborhood, which is a close mix of residential and commercial, again debated his claims that SoMa Imports will produce little new traffic, noise or disruption.

And they had lots of questions for Mr. DeMelo and realtor Jeff Souza.

Such as: Where will visitors and employees park? ... What hours will the business operate? How will six cars fit within that small building? What if this becomes just another in Westport's strip of used car lots? And why is the town allowing the building's commercial use to expand in this manner.

Selectman Steven Ouellette

called it unusual for a business to have little or no exterior parking — the alternative would be to park on the small street. And he questioned whether the building has ventilation suited to vehicles with engines running.

But selectman Craig Dutra said he thought some of the project's critics are being unreasonable and that Mr. DeMelo has bent over backwards to address neighbors' concerns — selectmen alone have met three times on the matter.

His remarks came after neighbor Danielle Pineault asked that the proposed hours of operation — especially Sunday — be cut back.

Ms. Pineault called the selectmen's remarks "belligerent," and said that she has a right to speak out at a public hearing.

Mr. Souza repeated earlier claims that the obstacles being created for the business amount to harassment — this after neighbors were encouraged to call authorities any time they believe the business is violating the terms of its permit.

At an earlier meeting on the proposal, Town Planner James Hartnett told selectmen the reasons that DeMelo's business received a favorable site plan review, including that the business lot is zoned commercial and DeMelo's plans fall within the

allowed use.

Conditions for the SoMa license include a limit of six vehicles with storage restricted to indoors, no on-street parking of the firm's vehicle transport trailer, and prior approval by the fire department. Hours of operation will be: Monday, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.; Tuesday

through Friday, 5 p.m. to 7 p.m.; Saturday, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.; and Sunday (by appointment only), noon to 5 p.m.

The building is owned by Teresa and Joseph Ferreira who had once intended to use it as supply storage only for Ferreira's business Coastline Plumbing.

Stumbling forward

At a critical moment in its history, Tiverton is striking blissfully out into the future without guide or much of a guidebook, apparently confident that all will work out just fine.

For reasons unclear, the town has dismissed (declined to rehire) its planner, and, when he leaves at month's end, the planning department will effectively be without staff. If budget even allows hiring a new one (there has been talk that this might be a way to save a few dollars), replacement will take awhile given the pending departure of the town administrator as well.

Neither recent history nor common sense suggest that Tiverton should go without a planner, even briefly.

This loss comes at a most busy time for Tiverton planning. A casino is poised to move into town, several big residential projects loom, out-of-town developers continue to eye the Route 24 stretch for all manner of shopping and housing projects, a solar ordinance is being prepared, and seawater rise threatens large sections of town.

What most towns Tiverton's size have come to realize is that, while town plans are fine, they tend to gather dust on a shelf unless a talented person on the payroll is there to keep growth on course.

Tiverton's town plan (now in re-write) always speaks to a desire to maintain the town's rural charm, attract quiet, pretty, low-traffic sorts of businesses to help share the property tax burden, and encourage farming and fishing.

Those are tall orders in this day and age, especially without a planner to keep watch and show the way.

The town is blessed with talented volunteers on its planning and zoning boards but these are part timers. Few of them have the training or hours to devote to the minutia that the task entails, to tracking down grants (which typically pay the planning salary many times over) and assuring that subdivision are done right.

Tiverton should know better than most towns the cost of failing to plan.


Not so many decades ago, developers danced through the "planning" and zoning process en-route to building whole neighborhoods that, they certainly insisted at the time, would have little impact on town services, traffic or taxes.

Nobody noticed (or cared) that the roads they built were often too narrow for fire engines, and had neither proper drainage nor foundation. Those roads are falling apart now and the town is on the hook for untold millions of dollars.

The only ones who could applaud Tiverton's disinterest in planning are unscrupulous developers and those selfish enough to save a few dollars now at extraordinary cost to generations to come.

Too much is at stake to blunder ahead without a planner.

For osprey females, a near-motionless month begins

To the editor:

While daffodils burst into bloom and we rev up our lawnmowers, female osprey are hunkering down for five weeks of stillness. For the next 35 days or more, each female has the important job of radiating her warmth to three or four eggs beneath her and simultaneously sheltering the eggs from rain, wind, parasites, and predators.

Every so often she will rise up to gently turn the eggs as needed, perform a brief personal grooming, and maybe take a spin around the marsh if her mate is willing to fill an incubation shift. If her mate is particularly inclined towards

child care, she could even enjoy a meal out on her own. Most pairs adhere to a pretty conventional division of labor. Success lies in the female's determination to sit tight and the male's determination to bring home as much fish as she will eat.

Mass Audubon's team at Allens Pond Wildlife Sanctuary keeps track of the breeding activity at nearly 90 nests in the Westport River/Allens Pond Important Bird Area. With the help of trained volunteers, who work both from roadside or shoreline vantage points as well as aboard the Osprey Project's skiff, a comprehensive dataset is collected and

shared with collaborating scientists. Project sponsors play a critical role in supplying the funds for staff oversight, boat operation, and the equipment and materials.



Leite's Culinaria (leitesculinaria.com) in 1999. In 2006, he was the first winner of a James Beard Award for a website, a feat he repeated in 2007. His writing has appeared in the New York Times, Martha Stewart Living, Saveur, Bon Appétit, Food & Wine, Pastry, Men's Health, and many newspapers.

Essex Library sells for \$395,000

bathrooms, and no kitchen. The footprint is absolutely lovely. I'd leave the main room as a single room; it's as I imagine a library to be."

The purchase and sale agreement states that the existing metal book cases and shelves and light fixtures are to remain.

"What I like most is the spirit of the place," he said. "It's not the bricks and mortar so much as it is the legacy that appeals. It's a beautiful thing. It's clear to me from the effort people put into the new library."

The property is still in transition. The inspection period has been extended to April 28 by the town council, at its meeting this last week and at the request of the new owner.

The conveyance will be by a warranty deed.

The cornerstone for the old library was put in place in 1938, and it was built in 1939. It has a gabled slate roof, and is heated with oil/forced air.

The main floor of the building itself has 2,224 square feet, but with the basement and patio is 4,530 square feet. It sits on a lot that is 2.09 acres, and is zoned R40.

TIVERTON — Tiverton's historic Essex Library will pass into private ownership on Tuesday, May 16. That is the date when the much-debated sale of the property will close.

The sale price, stated in a purchase and sales agreement approved by the town council in executive session on March 27, is \$395,000. According to town tax assessor records, it is assessed for tax purposes at \$448,800.

The new owner is Richard A. Epstein, 59, of Dummerston, Vermont, about 10 miles north of Brattleboro. Mr. Epstein is a real estate developer who said he renovates properties.

Town voters at the Financial Town Referendum of 2016 "authorized and directed" the town council to sell the property "at fair market value," and the council put the building up for a brokered sale earlier this year.

"I'm well aware that the Essex Library is an icon, and beloved by the community, and I understand I'm taking it as a stew-

ard for the building and all it stands for," Mr. Epstein said. "Lydia Essex was a school teacher and she must have loved the community to give such a gift to it."

He said he learned about the property from friends in Little Compton. He

doesn't plan to live in the place, "not initially anyway," he said.

Mr. Epstein plans to work on the building over the next two years, with the priority being the septic system. "it's the key to the property. There are only two half

General treasurer has innovative plans

Kudos to General Treasurer Seth Magaziner for coming up with 2 great proposals, one of which would strengthen municipal pensions and the other which stimulates loans to small Rhode Island businesses. The municipal pension plan would require legislative action. The "Bank Local" program was initiated by the Treasurer's office and already has at least 5 small financial institutions participating in the program. Here are the details:

Strengthen municipal pension systems

The Treasurer's Healthy Local Pensions (HELP) proposal would allow cities and towns with locally administered pension systems to improve performance and reduce costs through the state's Municipal Employees Retirement System (MERS). At present more than 75 percent of municipal pension

plans are already in the MERS system. Of the remaining pension plans in the towns and cities most are seriously underfunded with 19 below 60 percent funded and 12 below 40 percent. A couple of municipalities had higher pension returns at present but, like Providence (which is only 27 percent funded), are still woefully underfunded. The recent higher return led firefighter union head, Paul Doughty, to eschew joining the state program.

Beneath the surface of his opposition based on the argument of a higher return, however, lurks the fear that some of the more outrageous benefits offered by the City's pension board would be curtailed. MERS requires strict and sustainable criteria so I suspect that the "party may be over" mentality is really behind the opposi-

STRAIGHT UP THE MIDDLE

Around the bases again in Pawtucket

Baseball is back on the political agenda in Rhode Island again this year. After spending much of 2016 assuring fans that the PawSox were committed to Pawtucket — and to Rhode Island — the team continues to look at options other than McCoy for their future home. This year the team seems focused on approaching this challenge the right way, by gathering facts and making its case. Even folks who are most opposed to building a new stadium have to acknowledge that McCoy is dated and not up to the standards of the rest of the league. I've heard folks say "it's fine for Pawtucket" but I think it's time to reject that loser mindset and look ahead. Wouldn't it be nice if players and teams talked about Pawtucket and Rhode Island in glowing terms?

A study released earlier this year showed that that upgrading McCoy would cost \$68 million while demolishing and rebuilding on the same site would cost \$78 million. The \$68 million option is probably the least appealing since the report noted that it would likely generate "minimal return" on the investment. Demolishing it and rebuilding it seems like a not-so-great option too as some of the challenges (proximity to the highway and isolation from other redevelopment areas) remain by reusing the existing site. The team is also looking at other sites in Pawtucket, and probably in other states. Springfield and Worcester were once publicly wooing the team.

The trickiest part of this public policy challenge is that there are three parties involved, all with different financial interests. The city owns the stadium and is desperate to keep the team in Pawtucket. The

state leases the stadium from the city and subleases it to the team, giving it a less compelling reason to keep it in Pawtucket while still wanting it to stay in state. The team's lease is up in 2021 and the ownership is made up of a mix of Rhode Islanders and others. They need to make the franchise more profitable by keeping their overhead down and the fan base enthusiastic.

Opponents of the stadium are (rightly) concerned that a new stadium will cost the taxpayers many millions of dollars and serve only as a way to generate revenue for the wealthy stadium owners. This kneejerk reaction isn't wrong, but it is a bit misguided. A new stadium can (and would) serve a public benefit and needs to be sold as such. While the ownership of the team has so far done a better job of educating the public about the choices (repair, rebuild or relocate), they've done less to educate Rhode Islanders about the benefits of having the Paw Sox here and what a new and better stadium could attract. I understand their stepping lightly after they were solidly rebuffed in Providence, but they're going to have to take another trip around the bases — touching on all their best messages — to get this one done.

tion. Providence's pension system is a basket case and it seems like Mr. Doughty and others want their fiefdom to continue despite the dismal security ratio of assets to obligations. "Turf" considerations and special interests may try to block the treasurer's proposal albeit it is one that is optional for municipalities. The General Assembly should pass the legislation since it will lower administrative costs and stabilize the pensions for present workers. There will also be savings as well for towns and cities since they need not have the infrastructure to monitor the local pensions.

Bank local program

The General Treasurer has implemented a community deposit program, moving millions of dollars in state deposits only (no pension fund money) into local small banks and credit unions in order to encourage loans to Rhode Island small businesses. The state deposits its money in the local bank as a match for the small business loans underwritten by the smaller institutions. The state's money is insured and collateralized at 102 percent of the deposit, so it is safe. Many smaller financial institutions give a better interest rate than the large banks who have heretofore been the only beneficiaries of the deposits, so the state stand to gain more money. It's a win/win/win for the smaller banks, the small business owner, and the state. To date at least 5 smaller institutions have joined the program and collectively, they have given out \$5 million of small business loans. The treasurer doesn't pick the recipients since the bank or credit union does, using its own criteria for the loan. This is a very creative way to use the treasurer's office to encourage economic growth and job creation.

So, while sometimes politicians might make the public furious, let's give a "hat's off" to the creative ideas put forth by Treasurer Magaziner.

NO FLUKE

Tautog season open; stripers moving into bay

Tautog fishing is fun. I like to relax with friends and family, shoot the breeze and enjoy a great Rhode Island fishery all at the same time. Tautog (or Blackfish) is a great eating fish too with a dense whitish meat.

You have to be over or near structure (rocks, piers, wrecks, ledge, humps or holes, etc.) to catch tautog so anglers use a

number of strategies to ensure their vessel stays in position. The trick is positioning the vessel without getting your anchor stuck in rock. I've lost three anchors over the years which can cost as much as \$300 to \$500 depending on the type of anchor and chain.

Anglers often use a grappling hook anchor make of rebar to tautog fish. The soft rods allow the anchor to bend if it should get caught in structure. Capt. Sherriff said, "Another method used by anglers is to tie a line to the end of their Danforth or grappling hook anchor (opposite the chain end) and attach a float to the other end of the line." When ready to leave they pick up the float and line which pulls the anchor out of the structure the same way it went in.

I use an anchor retrieval system (westmarine.com) which cost about \$100. A float on a six foot line is attached to your anchor line with a sliding metal ring. When the vessel is pulled forward toward and beyond the anchor the ring eventually works its way down to the anchor and the float brings the anchor to the surface where you can retrieve it off the stern. The trick is not getting the anchor line caught in your prop as you move forward toward and beyond the anchor.

Another method that worked well for me when I had a smaller center console was the use of a cinder block as an anchor. The cinder block costs about \$1.50. However, it often does not hold in strong current or seas and does not work well with large or

heavy vessels.

Anchoring over structure takes some practice too. Locate a rock pile with electronics, estimate wind/drift direction and anchor up current from where you want to fish and drift back to the spot as the anchor is setting. Once in position, fish all sides of the boat casting a bit to cover as much area as you can. If still no bites, let some anchor line out a couple of times to change your position, if still no bites it is time to move the vessel. Watch for more tautog fishing tips next week.

The Rhode Island Department of Environmental Management (DEM) regulates tautog fishing with three seasons. The spring tautog season opened Saturday, April 15 and ends May 31 with a three fish/person/day limit; fishing reopens August 1 to October 14 with a three fish/person/day limit; and then the late fall/winter season runs from October 15 to December 15 with a six fish/person/day limit.

A fishery-wide closure, to protect tautog during their spawning period, is in effect from June 1 to July 31. At all times when the fishery is open, there is a limit of 10 fish/vessel daily limit. Party and charter boats are not subject to the 10 fish/vessel limit.

Striped bass coming on strong

On-the-Water magazine's striped bass migration tracker (onthewater.com/striped-migration-map) shows school striped bass are working their way north up the Connecticut coastline and starting to land on Rhode Island southern coastal shores and at the mouth of Narragansett Bay. Keeper striped bass are being caught off New York.

Jason Howell of Narragansett fished the Narrow River in Narragansett this last week and landed school striped bass. Too early

to tell if fish are migrating fish or hold-over striped bass.

Where's the bite

Freshwater fishing is where the action is right now. Trout and largemouth bass fishing remain very strong. "A customer caught a 3.5 pound largemouth bass at Brickyard Pond in Barrington this week," said John Littlefield of Archie's Bait & Tackle, Riverside. "Anglers are doing very well with largemouth bass, we sold a lot of shiners this weekend," said Craig Mancini of Continental Bait & Tackle, Cranston.

Tautog fishing season opened up Saturday, April 15. Some anglers targeted them this weekend with poor results as it was quite windy. Mike Cardinal of Cardinal Bait & Tackle said, "We did not have many customers target tautog, things should get going later this week." Macedo said, "Customers targeted tautog at Stone Bridge, Wharf Tavern and other places but did not get a bite." Fishing further up the bay was not good either. Littlefield said, "A customer fished the Nayatt Point area for tautog but the wind picked up and he came back, he had a couple of good bites but no fish. Others targeted Wharf Tavern, Jamestown and Newport but we haven't heard back from them yet."

An easy, elegant chicken and mushroom dish with fresh herbs

Use fresh herbs and flavorful mushrooms for this dish. It makes all the difference.

Three-Herb Chicken and Mushrooms

Serves 2

- 1 1/2 teaspoons all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup chicken broth
- 1/4 cup dry white wine or chicken broth
- 1 tablespoon Dijon-style mustard
- 1 1/2 teaspoons snipped flat-leaf Italian parsley

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Season chicken on both sides with salt, pepper, half the rosemary and half the thyme. Heat the olive oil over medium heat in a cast iron skillet or oven-going skillet.

This is such an easy, yet elegant dish. But, it needs a flavorful mushroom. Don't use white, button mushrooms as they are too bland. I found cremini, shiitake or baby bellas (or once a mix of cremini and oyster mushrooms) were so much better. And, use fresh herbs. It really makes a big difference.

My rosemary survived the winter (hurray!) and the thyme usually hangs in there all winter and did again this year. It's worth planting fresh herbs in a protected area of your yard just for cooking. And, they smell nice.

Serve this over rice or noodles with a green vegetable.

- 4 small or 2 large chicken thighs, skin on
- Salt and black pepper
- 1 tablespoon snipped fresh rosemary
- 1 tablespoon snipped fresh thyme
- 1 1/2 teaspoons extra-virgin olive oil
- 6 ounces fresh mushrooms, halved and/or quartered (use a flavorful mushroom, such as cremini, shiitake or baby bellas)

Martin's Garden Notes

THE GLORY OF FORSYTHIA

Forsythia are a great welcome to spring with their bright golden blooms. They grow quite large so you don't need many. Give forsythia about 8 feet by 8 feet of space. When large enough, you can cut branches in the winter and let them bloom in a vase. After a few years, remove a few of the oldest branches to the ground when blooming is over. This encourages new shoots so your Forsythia will maintain a graceful form and a manageable size.

Witch Hazel bloom even earlier than forsythia, often in mid February. They grow in an upright vase shape and we stock **Arnold's Promise** is a golden yellow. A good companion for Forsythia is the **Rhododendron PJM**, a popular variety with purple blooms that contrast nicely with forsythia. There are a similar varieties, including Olga (hot pink) and that bloom a little later for a nice sequence.


For for later blooms, **Viburnum, Hydrangea, and Weigela**, are good choices.
