Carousel commission unveils masterplan of improvements

City's bond rating continues on upward trajectory

A return to its roots of sorts could be in the offing if an outline for improvements at Crescent Park can be funded in the future.

The chairman of the Carousel Commission and the city's community development director presented a masterplan for redevelopment at the site at last week's city council meeting. The proposed improvements include constructing a train ride and improving amenities around the historic Loeff Carousel. The council eventually backed the effort on a 5-0 vote.

According to commission chair Chrissy Rossi, the trackless train ride would be installed on the grounds and serve as an additional revenue source for the carousel. Community Development coordinator David Bachrach discussed the structural improvements proposed, which would see the construction of commercial space that could also be used to increase revenue and support the upkeep of the historic ride.

The upgrades would cost approximately \$250,000, which is also the figure cited as the potential increase in annual revenue generated once the improvements are made.

As of now, the commission has access to

approximately \$150,000 in donations and grant money for the project. The city has committed some \$70,000 in the current capital budget to match one of the grants secured by Mr. Bachrach's office. Mrs. Rossi said the priority for the commission is to now secure the remaining monies needed through fundraising efforts.

While expressing his support of the effort, Ward 1 representative and council president Jim Briden requested the city's planning department have continued input in the process. "I value the opinion of the planning director and the planning department should review this."

Ratings increase

East Providence's standing in the financial world continues to improve as the Standard & Poor's Ratings Services last week once again raised the city's general obligation bond rating.

Acting city manager Tim Chapman made the announcement during his report. He said S&P had upgraded East Providence's bond rating three levels from "AA" to "A."

The meaning of the rating uptick, which follows similar adjustments made in recent years following East Providence's near "junk" rating almost five years ago, is significant. The city can now hope to seek its annual Tax Anticipatory Notes or "TANs" or other loans expecting favorable interest rates. The S&P analysis put East Providence's financial grade at SP-1, which is a "strong

capacity to pay principal and interest."

Advertisement change

The council gave its first of two necessary approvals to a change in the language of the hiring ordinance, which recently caused a stir in regard to the procedures last followed during the fire department recruitment process.

At the suggestion of Councilman Faria, the wording. "The director of personnel shall also place advertisements in a newspaper of general circulation in the city" would be struck and replaced by "on the City's website."

Of note as well, Councilwoman Sousa was chosen as the body's Ad Hoc member

to the Planning Board.

Portugal Day

At the behest of Councilwoman Sousa, the council approved a resolution adopting June 10 as "Celebration Day of Portugal." The day will feature cultural recognition events and the flag of Portugal will be raised at city hall.

Marathon returns

For a fourth year in a row, the council gave its approval for the running of the Narragansett Bay Half Marathon and 5K, this year to take place on May 28. The event, which begins and ends inside Pierce Memorial Stadium, was called a "great success" by race coordinator Geoff Smith.

He noted, however, the date change for the event from late June to late May due to concerns over participants' health. Mr. Smith said the three previous races have been run in roughly 90-degree heat, which sent many runners to the hospital. The hope is the late-May date will have lower temperatures and less humidity.

Tax donation

The council approved a recommendation from Councilman Faria to include a donation box on the new fiscal year property tax payment receipts to be directed to the East Providence Veterans Affairs Commission. The donation can be in any denomination.



Charter Commission starts amending manager language

Appointed body begins process of making changes to governing document

The East Providence Charter Review Commission of 2017 held its first comprehensive meeting last week, March 9, in city hall where the appointed members discussed and disseminated the city's governing document as it pertains to the voter-approved change in form to an elected mayor.

The commission started the process of making technical amendments as it followed an outline presented by its chairman, Jim Russo, who is an attorney and who began tweaking the charter by either eradicating or editing its language where the term "manager" must be switched to "mayor."

In addition, Mr. Russo said he tried to make the charter read more "modern." He explained he had taken up the task of correcting verbiage to be "gender inclusive," by which he changed nouns and pronouns that reference only "man" (i.e. councilman) or "he" to also include "woman" or "she." Also, he said he attempted to eliminate any obvious "outdated language." As well, he said he tried to fix any apparent grammatical errors.

Among the more pertinent changes made last week, the commission ridded the charter of references to annual salary of the former council-chosen ceremonial mayor position as well as those to the "four-year terms" of elected officials, which were included following the 2012 election but never implemented because the General Assembly failed to formally ratify the vote.

Large swaths of Article III Section 3 of the

document were removed because it dealt with the council's appointment and removal of the city manager as well as the qualifications for the position. Also, footnotes referencing the manager were taken out.

Section 3-10 was changed to confer the power of appointing members of the solicitor's office to the elected mayor with council approval, something Mr. Russo pointed out was specifically included in the referendum passed by voters in November 2016.

A slight change was made to Article IV,

Section 4-3 in regard to the salary of the finance director. Since the charter was originally written in the 1950s, the finance director's salary has been capped at \$7,000, though it has obviously been altered with the times. The new wording reads the finance director shall receive "such a salary as set by ordinance."

One last point of note, Mr. Russo requested assistant city solicitor and commission counsel Dylan Conley look into the sections of the charter precluding city workers

from seeking elected office and also of probate court appointments. The chairman wondered if those aspects contradicted state law.

Before adjourning, the commission approved the inclusion of a public comment section in each of its subsequent meetings. Speakers will be given the floor for five minutes.

The commission plans on meeting every Thursday evening in Room 306 at City Hall at 7 p.m. until its mandate is fulfilled.

Barrington begins new sewer treatment process

It's an attempt to curb odors generated at Riverside plant

Do not be surprised to see Bison at three of Barrington's sewer pumping stations in the near future.

Well, not actual bison.

The town has decided to install a new sewage treatment system called Bison at three of its pumping stations in an effort to reduce sulfides in the sewage. Fewer sulfides in the sewage, said officials, will help to eliminate an odor problem that has surfaced at a Riverside wastewater treatment facility.

For the last few months, officials in East

Providence have been blaming Barrington for the bad smell surrounding the Riverside facility. East Providence's acting city manager Tim Chapman said at a council meeting "the smell is coming from Barrington."

Officials from both towns met with local legislators and representatives from the Rhode Island Department of Environmental Management to hatch out a solution, and according to Barrington Town Manager Jim Cunha, the Bison 220 system could be that solution.

Mr. Cunha said other communities, including Warwick, have used the Bison and found promising results. He said the Bison has been shown to reduce sulfides in the wastewater, which can sometimes lead

to erosion of sewer pipes.

There will be a \$1,000 up-front cost to installing the Bison at the Brickyard Pond, Walnut Road and Bay Springs pumping stations, the manager added.

"It will be a 60-day trial period," Mr. Cunha said.

If the system works, said the manager, the town will enter into a contract with Bison at a cost of \$10,000 per month. Bison is also conducting an analysis of the current sewer system and water treatment plant, said Mr. Cunha. East Providence officials have said that the company contracted to run the wastewater treatment facility already conducted an analysis that specified Barrington as the source of the problems. Barrington officials have coun-

tered, stating that the analysis needs to be conducted by an independent third-party.

"I truly believe that Barrington is part of the problem," said Mr. Cunha. "But I am not convinced that we are the only part of the problem... I think East Providence has a problem too."

While many East Providence officials point toward Barrington as the source of the smell, officials in this town have argued that they have been treating Barrington sewage for a long time.

Mr. Cunha said installation of the Bison system will occur within the next few weeks.

Barrington residents paid \$2 million in sewer fees to East Providence in 2015. That figure fell to \$1.84 million in 2016.



RIDOT announces Newman Avenue bridge repair begins March 20

First phase of reconstruction to last for four days

The Rhode Island Department of Transportation (RIDOT) today announced upcoming closures of Route 152, Newman Avenue as part of the Newman Avenue Bridge Replacement Project.

The first closure of Newman Avenue, from Barney Street to the Massachusetts state line, is scheduled to last for four days, beginning on Monday, March 20.

The structurally-deficient Newman Avenue Bridge carries approximately 9,000 vehicles per day on Newman Avenue over the 10 Mile River. Built in 1934, the bridge has deteriorated to a point that is beyond the scope of repair or rehabilitation. Through a \$4.7 million, two-year construction contract with John Rocchio Corporation, \$2.6 million of which represents the cost of construction, the Department will replace the bridge using conventional construction methods.

During the first closure period, from March 20-March 23, RIDOT will install barrier, signing and striping, and add a temporary traffic signal for a new alternating one-way traffic pattern that will be used throughout the duration of the project, currently slated for completion in Spring 2019.

During closure periods, motorists are advised to follow the recommended detour using the turn-by-turn directions described below. Local access will be maintained. Get detour maps at www.ridot.net/detourmaps.

Newman Avenue Detours

Eastbound: Follow Route 1A/Pawtucket

Avenue south; Stay left for Route 114A/Pleasant Street; Pleasant Street becomes Fall River Avenue; Turn left onto Route 44/Taunton Avenue; Turn left onto Arcade Avenue; Return to Newman Avenue

Westbound: Follow Arcade Avenue south; Turn right onto Route 44/Taunton Avenue; Turn right onto Route 114A/Fall River Avenue; Fall River Avenue becomes Pleasant Street; Stay right for Route 1A/Pawtucket Avenue; Return to Newman Avenue

The second closure, anticipated to begin approximately one week after the completion of the first, will start the demolition process, when crews will work to demolish the north side of the bridge. This process should take about two days. Later this year, RIDOT plans to have another short-term closure to install the new concrete beams. This will be followed by paving of the first half of the bridge, and then putting traffic on the new structure.

During the 2018 construction season, the Department plans to continue the process on the second half of the bridge, with demolition, concrete beam placement and paving, prior to opening the new Newman Avenue Bridge completely to traffic. This will be followed by resurfacing of approximately ¼ mile of Newman Avenue on either side of the new structure.

Review process will be transparent

To the editor:

I want to take a moment to address a letter to the East Providence Post regarding the Charter Review Commission on which I serve.

The letter spoke of transparency, we have been completely transparent from the beginning. The matter truly at hand was public participation and while the whole business made for good drama, it was overblown and premature.

Our first meeting, on March 2nd was an organizational meeting. It was open to the public as all of our meetings are. During that meeting and the discussion of the phases in which we would work, there was mention that the draft document, if done as a Google Document which allows for live edits, would not be exposed to the public while being actively edited.

I supported this for a couple of reasons, firstly because our legal counsel raised issues as to the Open Meetings Act if the document while being actively edited was shared and members of the commission commented on it in a

public setting such as social media. I also didn't want to give the public a false impression of what was going on in such a draft form. I believe these two issues would go hand in hand as people who may have concerns would call out commissioners on social media, and because of the OMA, we would be unable to respond. It is not, as the letter asserts, an issue of the council properly vetting commissioners.

Mr. Oliver, whom I have known for almost two decades now, raised the issue on the evening of 3/2 on Facebook both on a post by Councilman Faria and on his own page. In both places I told him that night or the next morning that I would be addressing it with my fellow commissioners at the next meeting on 3/9. On 3/3 at 1:26am, I emailed our Chair Jim Russo, Secretary Val Perry and Mayor Briden asking for the item of be placed on the agenda for 3/9. The technical amendment we discussed on 3/9 was made available with the meeting agenda on Clerkbase and in print at the

meeting.

At the meeting on 3/9 we setup a procedure for public comment that will be at the beginning of each meeting. The rules are that the comments must be on the agenda items for that evening and there is a time limit of 5 minutes. I think this is fair and reasonable. We held public comment on 3/9 after passing those rules and one member of the public spoke.

In addition, members of the public that cannot make the meeting or choose not to address their concerns verbally may contact City Clerk Kim Casci (kcasci@cityofeastprov) and she will forward any remarks or concerns to the commissioners.

While I have great respect for Mr. Oliver and for public participation, his letter on this subject was premature. I understand it is difficult to take people's word these days but I raised the issue as I promised and the commission took wise action on it.

Hawks hammer Townies in boys' state hoops event

Top-seeded Hendricken knocks East Providence out of Open Tourny

PROVIDENCE — The East Providence High School boys' basketball team squared off against the number one overall seed in the Open State Tournament Hendricken, the Hawks proving to be too much to handle as the Townies were defeated 74-55 Sunday afternoon, March 12, at Brown University's Pizzitola Center in the 'Elite 8' round.

In the first half, E.P. stayed right with Hendricken point for point until the Hawks went on an impressive 28-9 run to end the half. If it wasn't for Ben Sears, who finished with eleven points in the first half, the Townies deficit could have been larger than 49-29.

In the second half, the Hawks maintained their lead all the way through and coasted to a win as Deyshawn Tengbeh finished

with a team-high 13 points for the Townies.

"They are physical and aggressive," East Providence head coach Joe Andrade said. "We did what we wanted to against their pressure, but what killed us was we didn't make a shot or two and that killed us defensively."

To start the game, the two teams came out firing as back-to-back buckets from Tengbeh allowed the Townies to keep pace early with Hendricken. As the Hawks continued to be consistent offensively, back-to-back threes from Ben Sears gave E.P. their first lead of the game, 12-11.

Six points unanswered from Hendricken proceeded which forced the Townies to call a timeout as they found themselves in a 21-15 hole. A steal and bucket from Tengbeh was followed by a three from Dion Hazard which brought the Townies within one. Two more points from Sears on a baseline jumper and E.P.'s deficit was just 27-26. A three from Hendricken's Jalen Watson, his fourth of the game at the time, gave the

Hawks a 32-26 before a Hawks' timeout. Back on the floor, Hazard picked up his third foul of the game before Watson scored once more for Hendricken as the Hawks started to go on a run with the score now set at 39-26.

E.P. continued to be in foul trouble as their leading scorer, Tengbeh, picked up his third foul as well as Watson scored two more of his 19 point first half performance. This all allowed Hendricken to head into the locker room with all the momentum and a 49-29 lead.

"That was putting our head down offensively and not stopping them defensively," Coach Andrade said. "I knew Watson was a shooter, but I didn't expect him to do that, but you have to tip your hat to them."

To begin the second half, E.P. went on a 9-4 run that was sparked by a corner three from Kyerstan Casey that brought the Townies' deficit down to 53-38 which forced the Hawks to call a timeout. After the break

in action, Hendricken scored five unanswered points as the Townies missed open shots that forced E.P. to call a timeout with the Hawks' lead now at 58-38.

E.P. proceeded to sub in bench players as Hendricken continued to pile it on as their lead increased to 64-42 with just five minutes remaining. Over the waning minutes, the Hawks subbed in their bench players as well and were able to maintain their lead over the Townies as they went onto celebrate a victory and a trip to the 'Final 4' while E.P.'s season came to an end.

The Townies finished 14-8 in league and postseason play combined and won a round in the Open State Tournament in their first year under new head coach Joe Andrade.

"It was interesting to say the least," he said. "I think there are things people don't see everyday so they make assumptions, but a great group of kids and we are going to have most of them back next year. I am excited."

Rams end E.P.'s girls' hoops tourney run

LaSalle lands 'Final Four' spot with victory over Townies

PROVIDENCE — The East Providence High School girls' basketball team met its match Saturday afternoon, March 11, at Brown University's Pizzitola Center in the quarterfinal round of the 2017 Open State Tournament as the Division II Townies fell to second-seeded, rival and D-I LaSalle, 47-34.

In the first half, E.P. stayed competitive thanks to their good defense as Courtney Dorr scored seven points of her team-best 16 points to put their deficit at 24-15. After the intermission, the Townies hung tough until the very final minutes when LaSalle pulled away.

"They never stopped, they never do, and I didn't expect anything less of them today," EPHS interim head coach Zach Roche said. "We were right there with them at the end and that is all we can ask for."

To start the game, LaSalle come out fast as they scored six unanswered points before Shaniah Hazard put an end to the Rams run with two made free throws to put E.P.'s deficit at 6-2 early on.

After a timeout, LaSalle continued to lead but the Townies' 1-3-1 defense kept them in it until Dorr hit a three to bring E.P.'s hole down to 9-5 with just under eight minutes remaining in the half.

"Our 1-3-1 is what we have hung our hat on all season long and I have never seen a team do it this well at the varsity level," Coach Roche said. "They were incredible which starts with Julia Andrade at the back playing the whole game."

The Townies started to find their shot as Hazard scored off an offensively rebound and Conti tied the game at nine on a fast break score.

LaSalle proceeded to score six unanswered points on three consecutive possessions that earned the Rams a 15-9 lead that forced E.P. to call a timeout.

Back on the court, Dorr drove to the basket and earned a trip to the line where she hit both to shrink the Townies' hole to 17-11.

Amber Drainville then earned a trip to the line herself where she drilled both to keep LaSalle within striking distance, 20-15.

LaSalle then earned two more points from Allyson Desrosiers which was just part of her eight point first half that helped put E.P. in a 24-15 hole heading into the locker room.

To start the second half, Drainville hit a hook shot and Hazard hit her two free throws to bring LaSalle's lead down to 26-22. This was before the Rams scored nine in a row including four at the line to increase their lead again to 37-22, causing E.P. to call a timeout.

After the break, Hazard drove to the basket where she was fouled and made her shot before Dorr made another three from the corner to bring the Rams' lead down to 39-27 which forced LaSalle to call a timeout.

Back on the court, Conti hit a three to help E.P. keep pace with the Rams before Coach Roche called a timeout with the Townies down 41-30 with 5:25 remaining.

Dorr continued to stay hot from beyond the arc as she hit another three to bring the Rams' lead down to 41-33. After another E.P. timeout, with just a couple minute remaining, LaSalle continued to hit their free throws which is all they needed to seal the deal over the Townies and advance to the 'Final Four' later this week at the University of Rhode Island's Ryan Center.

Meanwhile for E.P., the loss marked the end of a superb season that included the program's first-ever appearance in the D-II championship game and winning a round in the Open State Tournament. The Townies finished with an 18-5 record in league and playoff games.

"We our set our goal at the beginning of the season to make it to the Open State Tournament and not only did we make it here, but we won a game," Coach Roche said. "I don't know if I could have asked anything more."

Dorr, Hazard help Townies win first round games

Junior guard nets career-best 30 for girls, sophomore point hits clinching 3 for boys

The East Providence High School basketball teams received clutch performances from a couple of their players as the Townies each won first round games in their respective Open State Tournaments last week.

Courtney Dorr's career-best night propelled the EPHS girls past the Wheeler School, 53-42, in the opening round of the 2017 Open State Championship Tournament played at East Greenwich High Wednesday evening, March 8.

Dorr, the Townies' junior guard, netted 30 points total off symmetrical efforts of 15 in each half. Her performance included six 3-pointers. She spurred E.P. on a 14-0 run midway through the opening 16 minutes, which lifted the Townies from a 9-2 deficit to a 16-9 edge and a lead they would not relinquish the rest of the way.

"I couldn't do it without my team. If it wasn't for them, I wouldn't have been able

to do it. I'm just used to this court. We played here last year, so that could have been a reason why I was on tonight," said Dorr.

"She was unbelievable. When's she hot like that, we just have to let her keep shooting. She was getting to her spots. She was in the flow. It wasn't like she was doing it on her own. She was doing it in the flow of our offense. I thought we did a good job of working the ball around. And when she was the one who was open, she did a really nice job of getting her shot off," EPHS interim head coach Zach Roche said of Dorr. Roche was coaching his first game in the stead suspended head coach Mike Solitro.

The Warriors, seeded 10th in states and winners of the Division III championship with a 20-0 league record, never really challenged E.P. from there, though they received their own superb scoring effort from junior forward Emma Kiniry, who finished with a team-best 27. Kiniry did Dorr one better, canning seven 3s.

A clutch 3-pointer and a game-sealing free throw from Dion Hazard gave the EPHS boys just enough to squeak by

Tiverton, 55-51, Thursday evening, March 9, in the opening round of the 2017 Open State Tournament played at North Kings-town High School.

After a closely contested first couple of minutes, E.P. managed to pull away on the back of 12 first half points from Hazard that put Tiverton in a 26-18 hole heading into the locker room. Back on the floor, the Tigers came storming back from big deficits multiple times forcing Hazard to make a three with just 30 seconds left that proved to be the difference.

"They are a good team," E.P. head coach Joe Andrade said. "They didn't go undefeated for no reason. I don't care what division. It is a real good win."

Late in the game the Townies hung onto the ball for quiet some time before Hazard drilled a 3 with a man in his face to give E.P. a 54-51 lead with just 12.6 second left. He then made a free throw with two seconds showing to secure the win over the Division III champion Tigers. Earlier in the contest, Deyshawn Tengbeh scored 11 of his 17 points for the Townies consecutively as the locals opened up a working lead.



Getting in the swim of it

After a decade on the move, swimming school makes a home in East Providence

"I doubt there's another swim school that's had more locations," says Susan Pascale-Frechette about Pods Swimming. We have basically been operating — and growing — out of a car for years."

Susan, a former dental hygienist and Barrington resident, has been a swim instructor and coach for close to three decades. She launched Pods almost 10 years ago, with her sister Jamie serving as the school's program manager. Pods is accredited by the United States Swim School Association, and in fact was the first USSSA established swim school in the state of Rhode Island.

They had a great staff, a great program, and a loyal and satisfied client base. But they didn't have a pool. So they rented space in various facilities from one end of the state to the other. It was not unusual for Susan and Jamie to find themselves in a different pool every day of the week. With over 1000 clients, things got a little crazy. "It wasn't sustainable," said Susan. "We couldn't thrive."

That's all going to change this month. Pods' brand-new, permanent home will be opening its doors in March, at 111 Commercial Way in East Providence.

"We realized we needed to own a facility that could provide this programming under one roof," says Susan, of their previous arrangement, in which they would conduct some classes in shallow, warm water teaching pools, and others in large, 25-yard pools. "We needed a place for swimmers to grow. Once a child can swim a short distance, they need larger space to continue to learn, to experience what it is like to swim in deeper water."

Pods' new facility has both a shallow,

warm teaching pool ideal for the littlest swimmers, as well as a six-lane 25 yard pool.

While there are private clubs with pools, Pods is the state's first privately owned full-service aquatics center. "As an industry it was completely unknown to lenders," Susan said. "There was nothing comparable." Susan and Jamie brought in a swim consultant and

designed a state of the art facility with the cleanest water technology available.

"We wanted to do this the right way."

You don't have to take lessons to enjoy Pods' sparkling new facility — they will be offering lap swim several hours most days, as well as family swim times. Susan has also been approached by schools hoping for practice time for their teams, and she should be able to accommodate

some of them.

But her first priority will remain her loyal clients, many of whom have followed her nomadic travels around the state for several years. When Susan and Jamie finally throw open their doors — which is scheduled for Friday, March 17 — they will finally have a home of their own.

The swinging pendulum of spring in New England

on a preview. Didn't some of us try on summer clothes too and dust off our bikes? I got my booster shot of vitamin D by lightly tidying fallen stems and shattered grasses. But as usual, we were right to resist gardening too hard too soon. The pendulum swung.

We can't be blamed for worrying now about frigid cold and snow ruining everything's enthusiasm. I remember the year

magnolia flowers were torched to brown blobs by an unkind frost. So disappointing! And Heaven help us all if mophead hydrangeas go another summer without blooming. If only we could throw blankets over every temperature-sensitive opportunist in the yard. Worst case scenario, nothing blooms ever again. Perish the thought. Best case scenario, come April or May all's well pretty much mostly, and anyway, we re-learn to appreciate the things that hold out for more reliable cues like long days and warm soil below the surface.

Inside, protected from March's incon-

stancy, growth may be encouraged. For those of you who treat your houseplants with loving kindness, it's time to start fertilizing again. I'm not sure how they knew it but even plants I stuck down cellar last fall to go dormant in the dark, woke up. Without benefit of daylight to encourage chlorophyll production, albino shoots broke, evidently overnight, from the woody stems of Fuchsia 'Gartenmeister Bonstedt' and a potted toon tree (Toona sinensis 'Pink Flamingo'). The light of day will turn the fuch-

A 38 Studios investigation? Not!

Finally, the long-awaited release of records, well, sort of...from the Rhode Island State Police (RISP) of its 38 Studios investigation hit the streets. I wondered where had my beloved RISP disappeared with this sham of a disclosure. Apparently, the present Colonel, Ann

Assumpico, who was not the superintendent at the time, agrees. None of the 38 Studios senate interview transcripts were released, making one wonder whether any senators were even questioned once Senate President Teresa Paiva Weed said she met with Curt Shilling but told none of her colleagues about the legislation.

Then, there is the absence of transcripts from former Speaker Bill Murphy who stopped the cops in their tracks because he said he was representing miscreant Gordon Fox. What does that have to do with questioning him about HIS activities? Also missing were any transcripts of Attorney General Peter Kilmartin who was a top honcho in the General Assembly at the time. The latest news is that the then-head of RISP spoke to him and found nothing nefarious. No oath. No transcript.

The transcript of a sponsor of the 38 Studios bill, Former House Finance Chair Helio Melo, was missing. Ditto for former House Finance Chair Raymond Gallison,

former republican leader Joseph Trillo, former Rep. Peter Petrarca, and Rep. Brian Newbury. Dealmaker Michael Corso was not interviewed. Query whether these transcripts even exist.

The excuse may be that their statements went to the grand jury, but that practice is shoddy. Live witnesses should be called and put under oath. Here, statements were purely voluntary without any pain of perjury since none of them were sworn. Perhaps there is even more to the objection by the attorney general to release the grand jury testimony. While Mr. Kilmartin may be protecting his former cronies, it could be that he is protecting himself by such a slapstick presentation.

Governor Gina Raimondo has asked the court to release the grand jury records while the attorney general has objected, even though months ago he kissed goodbye to any indictments. Now a superior court judge will decide. Given how this case has played out I can't help but wonder if this is just a "good cop" (Ms. Raimondo) vs. the "bad cop" (Mr. Kilmartin) putting on a "wink wink" show for John Q. Citizen so the judge will give cover to both of them by upholding the prerogatives of the office of attorney general and thus block that information from becoming public. The judge, however, should allow the release so the thoroughness of the so-called 4 year investigation (which now looks more like a 4 hour one) can be assessed.

With all the yakking about bringing companies to Rhode Island, they'd have to be nuts to come to a state which stays up late at night figuring out how to obscure the truth from its own residents. It is laughable to watch the machinations of faking "accountability" while the maneuvering is to shroud the truth and let legislators off the hook.

Ms. Raimondo reneged on her campaign promise to have an independent investigation because it might be expensive and the public would learn nothing. Of course, citizens have learned very little as a result of this feigned transparency to date other than what appears to be a fiasco. The real costly results will be companies who stay away because of this political two-step and citizen cynicism.

sia foliage olive green again and the toon's new shoots will take on its remarkable namesake color. I'll have to keep an eye on my figs and with any luck, by the time they

break, it will be warm enough to throw some of these things outside. Because space is tight along windowsills and in my plantry.

I've tried to save room for seeds. Cool season crops and any seeds that take their time germinating can be sowed indoors now. Fitting a flat of sweet peas into an already over-full plantry has been like solving a tile puzzle. Light is a precious commodity in rooms without glass ceilings; the trick is to prevent one plant from casting too much shade on another. It's also essential not to block watering access by placing big containers in the way of smaller ones. I never manage to work it out quite right. The sweet peas germinated in a week — a record for me, not that I had anything to do with it — and want all the sun they can get.

Last year I purchased a cheap clear plastic "greenhouselet" and set it up in the driveway to accommodate plantry overflow. Sweet peas can take low, but not freezing, temperatures so as soon as March's lion takes a hike, I'll move them out along with the toon tree, fuchsia, figs, and sundry other temperate zone beauties. That should leave adequate space for the succession of seeds I'm starting under a grow-light in my office. Snow or no, since spring flipped that switch and got me growing again, I can't stop.

New resources for those with German and Irish roots

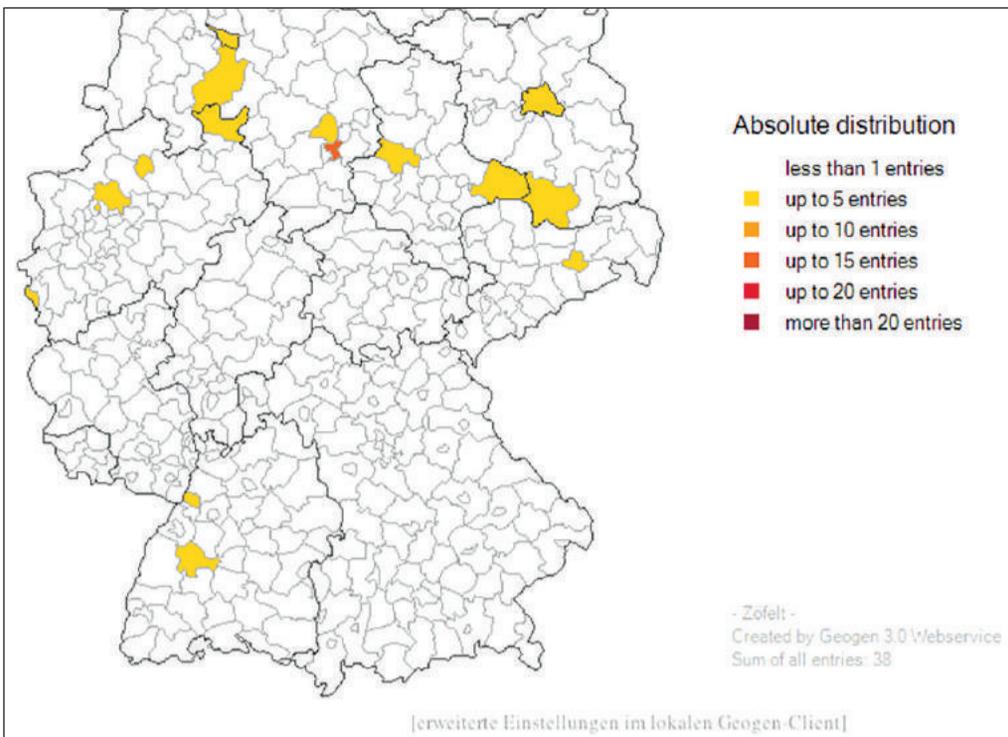
The Massachusetts Society of Genealogists will meet on Saturday, March 18, at Somerset Public Library, 1464 County St. The program at noon is by The Gravestone Girls. They will talk about gravestone art, history and symbolism and offer a visual tour from colonial burial grounds through the rural cemetery movement of the 19th and 21st centuries. It is free and open to the public.

And, there are lots of new sites out there just waiting to help you with your genealogy research. Here are just a few I've stumbled across.

■ If you have German roots, check out the Geogen site at <http://legacy.stoepel.net/en/Default.aspx>. The name stands for geographical genealogy. It's a surname mapping site that helps you find surnames in Germany. Before you start, click on "Information" on the homepage and read the short tips and description of the site.

When I entered my only German surname, Zufelt, there were no hits, but they asked if I meant Zofelt (two dots over the O). There were 38 entries in 15 counties. Then, check out the map. As you hover over each colored section, it tells you the name of the county.

■ Archion is at www.archion.de/en/the-portal. It was founded in 2013 by the Evangelical Church of Germany with 11 regional evangelical churches. Its primary goal is "to make church books and other biographical and genealogical resources available." They are adding church records from across Germany every day (and not just evangelical churches). At this time, there are 16 million pages of church books. Click on browse to see what they have. Searching is free, but if you want to access book material, there is a

fee starting with a one-month pass.

■ In September, those of us with Irish roots were thrilled to see the release of online Irish civil registration records at www.irishgenealog.ie. In 1863, it became compulsory to register all births, marriages and deaths by Jan. 1, 1864. These civil records (and non-Catholic marriages from 1845), over 12.5 million individual records, are free. At this time, they include births (1864-1915), marriages (1882-1940) and deaths (1891-1965) from the General Register Office (GRO). They are working on adding marriages back to 1845 and deaths back to 1864. The site also has links to the GROs

in Northern Ireland, England, Wales and Scotland.

But, you will want to combine these records with church records when possible. Fines were assessed for late registration, so it's obvious in some of my records that a parent lied about a birthdate to keep from being fined. Luckily, the church records are more accurate. But, the civil records have great information, including the mother's maiden name, occupation of the father (or of the deceased) and more.

■ A good source of Irish surnames is a "Special Report on Surnames in Ireland" from the Cornell University Library at

<https://archive.org/details/cu31924029805540>. Other maps of Irish surnames I've seen were never helpful. But, this one dates from 1894 and was compiled from the birth indexes in the General Register Office in 1890. My two Irish surnames are listed – McAree with three births in Antrim and three in Monaghan (where mine are from) and Ward – 168 births in every county, but chiefly where mine are not from.

■ And, this is a perfect time for a reminder to not forget Cyndi's List (www.cyndislist.com). Cyndi Howell's fabulous website is celebrating its 20th anniversary. The portal site has grown from a webpage with 1,025 links in 1996 to over 330,000 links today. No matter what you're looking for, you can find something on the subject at Cyndi's List. It's free and offers everything from what to do if you're just starting out to countries, vital records, DNA and so much more.

■ The David Rumsey Map Collection at www.davidrumsey.com has grown by 8,000 maps (to 75,000) since the last time I visited. There also is a blog, new pictorial maps and atlases, and a bunch of cool tools. You can zoom in on the maps and, a really neat feature, lets you use Google Earth to overlay current maps over the historic maps. A video on You Tube explains it at <https://youtu.be/6CnsEOTC27o>

■ www.eyewitnesstohistory.com is a free website with history listed by category (ancient world, Middle Ages, Renaissance, 17th century, Civil War, World War I, etc.) or check the index for a list of events.

House of the week

Historic cottage with modern updates in Tiverton



New to the market is a charming, historic cottage located in the heart of Tiverton's Stone Bridge/Fort Barton area. The house has been recognized by the Rhode Island Historical Preservation Commission and is located in the Stone Bridge Historic District. It is known as the Captain Seabury House.

An authentic farmhouse, the structure is a "complex cottage" with several roof pitches and angles, adding to the architectural interest of the home. There is a one-bedroom guest house on the

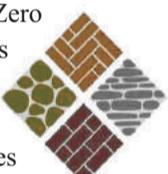
